The Buzz

Exciting news: Mettawa buys 113 acres from W.W. Grainger, plans to protect and restore open lands

The Village is delighted to announce an important land acquisition. Mettawa has purchased 3 parcels totalling nearly 113 acres from the W.W. Grainger company, and now this land will be securely protected from future development. This transaction stems from mutual agreements originally reached in 2018 and reflects a vibrant partnership between Mettawa and Grainger.

The purchased land includes the northeast and southeast corners of Riverwoods Road and Route 60 (near Costco), and the large field at the southwest corner of W. Everett Road and Riverwoods Road.

This acquisition is even more significant because it strategically protects key intersections from future development. The Village now owns three of four corners at the intersection of Route 60 and Riverwoods as well as the two corners north of the intersection of Everett and Riverwoods. All of these areas will remain undeveloped as protected natural spaces.

The Everett-Riverwoods parcel has been renamed the "Mettawa Savanna." Previously zoned for 26 residential lots, this large open field will be restored to a native savanna landscape.

"What an amazing asset for our Village," says Trustee Wendie Clark, Chairperson of the Parks and Recreation Committee. Plans are in place for a 2-3 year clean-up and restoration process of the Mettawa Savanna.

Trustee Clark notes that "the first reclamation work has begun with getting the land mowed!" After cutting brush and buckthorn, soybeans will be planted to help revitalize the land. Eventually the field will evolve into a full savanna landscape filled with native grasses and plants.

A long-term vision

This successful land purchase blossomed from a long-term vision. Mayor Urlacher and the Village Board wanted to build a mutually beneficial relationship with Grainger, our long-time corporate neighbor, bring the company back into the Village (after it was part of unincorporated Lake County for 27 years) and protect its many acres of vacant land from future development.

Mayor Urlacher was the constant force behind developing a strong relationship between the Village and Grainger, and fostering productive discussions. The Village Board provided active support for this growing partnership. The law firm, Klein, Thorpe, and Jenkins, also played an integral role in preparing documents and negotiating the terms.

In 2018, as result of many people's coordinated efforts, Grainger and the Village agreed to annex the company's 152-acre corporate headquarters into Mettawa with agreements that also enabled the Village to buy Grainger-owned properties and enter into an economic incentive agreement.

A smart financial decision

In 2023, the Village completed the land purchase after carefully considering many factors. The final agreements support the Village's best interests and reflect a mutually beneficial collaboration with Grainger.

Mayor Urlacher notes, "I'm so proud that we've made this happen. Slow and steady wins the race! These agreements set up the Village for long-term financial stability and we're protecting open space as we have always done in Mettawa and will continue to do."

The Village will pay for this property by splitting sales tax with Grainger 50%-50% for a period of 20 years. After that, the Village will receive 100% of Grainger sales tax for an expected total of \$1.2-1.4 million per year.

A good corporate neighbor

Grainger is a leading business-to-business broadline distributor that offers more than 30 million products globally. Its corporate headquarters in Mettawa are Gold-level LEED certified, and contain the world's first LEED-certified data center.

Mayor Urlacher says, "Mettawa continues to be so proud to welcome Grainger to the Village." &

New partnership for road safety

The Lake County Sheriff's Office continues to be the responding agency for Mettawa: they receive and respond to all 911 calls and will maintain an active presence in the Village.

The Village and the Lincolnshire Police Department (LPD) are collaborating on a pilot program to reduce speeding on Mettawa streets. Both municipalities are excited by this opportunity to work together.

In late summer, LPD began traffic enforcement throughout Mettawa. We've already seen results: for example, in September, LPD issued a total of 67 citations and warnings for speeding in Mettawa. We hope the additional police presence will help increase overall road safety, especially as winter approaches.

As a reminder, Mettawa Public Safety provides security services to the Village, including complimentary house watch services. If you are going out of town and would like to schedule a house watch, simply contact them at (847) 404-6272.
